Themba also thinks that his workers would be more productive if they were not members of a trade union.

Q4. Profam is an organisational that trains farmers' associations in commercial agriculture. The farmers are trained on how to deal with the 'economic problem' in farming. The farmers also learn how to add value and use financial ratios to determine the financial position of a business. The last aspect of the course seeks to inform farmers on different methods that can be used to calculate pay for farm workers. Profam advises the farmers to form joint ventures with companies that own large scale plantations.
